## REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR-GENERAL FOR THE YEAR 1959

### Review of the Year

1. Following the pattern established in recent years there was a substantial overall increase in the volume of work passing through the Department during the year. A falling off in estate duty work occasioned by the repeal of the Estate Duty Ordinance and a slight decrease in the number of fresh bankruptcy cases were matched by increased activity in the company, estate administration and trade union fields.

2. The chief points of interest connected with the multifarious activities of the Department are given in the succeeding paragraphs. At the end of the Report are set out Appendices which give statistics covering the more important subjects and provide comparative figures over the last decade.

### Companies Section

3. The section comprises the registries of Companies, Business Names, Limited Partnerships, Patents, Trade Marks, Chattels Transfer and Books and Newspapers. During the year the section dealt also with applications for certificates of exemption under the Credit to Africans (Control) Ordinance.

#### COMPANIES

4. Two hundred and seventy companies were registered in 1959. The nominal capital of these new companies with increases in nominal capital of companies already registered was £8,173,364. Both figures showed an increase on the corresponding figures for 1958 when 231 companies were registered with a nominal capital of £4,691,000.

5. The number of public and private companies incorporated in Kenya on the Register at 31st December, 1959, was 3,856, whilst the number of foreign companies maintaining a place of business in Kenya at the end of the year had risen to 570.

6. The proportion of companies formed during the year by members of the European community was 50 per cent. Of the balance members of the Asian community formed 43 per cent, the remaining 7 per cent being formed by Africans and by members of differing communities.

7. The amount of secured borrowing by companies during the year (exclusive of borrowing on current account) after deduction of the amount for which Memoranda of Satisfaction were registered showed a total of £13,345,865, which amount reflects the very considerable increase of £8,615,141 over the previous year's figure of £4,730,724.

#### BUSINESS NAMES

8. There was a decrease of 137 firms effecting registration under the Registration of Business Names Ordinance over the comparative figure for 1958.

9. Of the total of new registrations of 1,225 firms, 63 per cent were effected by members of the Asian community, 26 per cent by Africans and 11 per cent by Europeans. The number of Business Names on the Register at 31st December,



1959, was 17,528. As the latter total increases there is a consequential increase in the number of members of the public who wish to start new businesses under names which are the same or strongly resemble those already on the Register. As a result, during the year, in 196 cases proposed names of firms had to be refused on the grounds of similarity.

#### CHATELS TRANSFER

10. The total number of instruments, renewals and satisfactions registered under the Chattels Transfer Ordinance during the year was 3,070. The majority of the registrations related to agricultural assistance under the Agriculture Ordinance, 1955, and the European Agricultural Settlement Ordinance, 1955. The amount borrowed, as disclosed by the instruments, increased by £6,755 from the 1958 figure to a total of £1,759,369.

#### PATENTS

11. Seventy-two such registrations were effected during the year, a slight increase on the previous year's figure of 64. There were 940 patents in all on the Register at the end of the year.

#### TRADE MARKS

12. In the case of trade marks, original registration is effected in the Colony under the provisions of the Trade Marks Ordinance, 1955, which is based on the Trade Marks Act, 1938, of the United Kingdom. Statistics relating to the general work of the Trade Marks and Patent Registries, with comparative figures for the last decade, are shown in Appendix VII and Appendix VII (a).

13. There was an increase during the year both in the number of fresh applications and in the number of renewals of registration. In the event 480 fresh marks were registered; this constituted a decrease on the previous year's figure of 590 and may be accounted for by the larger number of applications which were the subject of interlocutory proceedings or had not been completed in accordance with the somewhat stringent requirements of the Ordinance.

14. A larger number than usual of proceedings by way of opposition or rectification came before the Registrar for hearing during the year. The number of trade marks on the Register at the end of the year was 6,759.

15. Because of frequent requests for enlarging time limits laid down for the completion of the various stages of proceedings in disputed cases, particularly where parties were resident overseas, the opportunity was taken during the year to extend various time limits by the making of the Trade Marks (Amendment) Rules, 1959.

#### BOOKS AND NEWSPAPERS

16. New registrations under the Books and Newspapers Registration Ordinance comprised nine books and 22 newspapers. Of the former, eight were in English and one in a vernacular; of the latter, 10 were in English and 12 in the vernacular.

#### CREDIT TO AFRICANS (CONTROL) ORDINANCE

17. Three thousand one hundred and thirty-nine applications for exemption under the Credit to Africans (Control) Ordinance were received during the period, out of which 2,012 certificates were issued during the year and 1,127 applications were pending for the issue of these certificates. The former figure reflects a sharp increase over the previous year's figure of 330 certificates and results undoubtedly from the increasing tempo of Government schemes for African agricultural and commercial assistance by way of loans.



18. Frequent visits to the Department by recipients of exemption certificates with the invariable enquiry regarding the grant of loans on the strength of the certificate would seem to indicate that the provisions of the Ordinance were not fully understood by the applicants.

### **Births, Deaths, Marriages, Naturalization and Registration Section**

19. This section carries out the work connected with the Registrar-General's duties as Registrar-General of Births and Deaths (including his duties as such under the Adoption and Legitimacy Ordinances) and as Registrar-General of Marriages. It also carries out registration work in connexion with naturalization.

#### **VITAL STATISTICS**

20. The number of current registrations of non-African births in the Colony was very slightly less, at 8,702, than the comparative figure of 8,761 in the previous year. The registration of African births is not at present compulsory. The number of late registrations authorized fell to 2,015, a decrease of 23 per cent from the previous year's figure.

21. The total of non-African deaths registered in the Colony, excluding the seven late registrations, was 1,661. Assuming the non-African population in mid-1959 to be approximately 279,000, this figure gives a crude death rate of just under 6 per 1,000. It is considered that this figure is rather lower than is likely to be the case, which suggests that if the population estimate is reasonably accurate all non-African deaths are still not being registered. Although the deaths of Africans in townships are subject to compulsory registration, with a very few exceptions, no such deaths were registered by next of kin during the year. In districts other than Nairobi, District Registrars have registered particulars of African deaths from medical certificates received from local hospitals. A total of 3,450 African deaths has therefore been included in these statistics of deaths. Little benefit can be derived from the figures of African deaths in urban areas, however, until it proves possible for the District Registrar in Nairobi also to register such deaths.

22. The duty to register a death, of course, remains with the next of kin and other persons as provided for under the Ordinance. It would seem, however, that until there is a general need amongst the African community for proof of deaths for evidential purposes, there is not likely to be compliance with this particular requirement unless it is possible for the authority issuing burial permits also to register the death at the same time.

23. The analysis of deaths registered during the year was based on the intermediate list of the International Classification of Diseases, Injuries and Causes of Deaths. Most deaths—1,032—were, as in 1958, under the class "ill-defined and unknown causes of morbidity and mortality". The next highest in the list, as in the previous year, was broncho-pneumonia (435), followed by gastro-enteritis and colitis (289).

#### **MARRIAGES**

24. The number of marriages celebrated under the Marriage Ordinance and the African Christian Marriage and Divorce Ordinance respectively amounted to 13,289. This figure represented an increase of 88 per cent over the 1958 total, and is to some extent explained by the fact that a number of certificates were received for registration under the African Christian Marriage and Divorce Ordinance which related to marriages celebrated prior to 1959.



### **The Public Trustee and Enemy Property Section**

25. This section carries out the administration of deceased estates under the Public Trustee Ordinance and the management of trusts accepted under the same Ordinance. The Public Trustee is, also, from time to time appointed manager of persons of unsound mind under the Mental Treatment Ordinance, 1949, and has to make an annual report on accounts submitted by other managers during the course of each year.

26. There was once more a considerable increase both in the number of new estates accepted for administration and in the number of estates already under administration which were finalized and distributed during the year. Five hundred and eleven new estates were accepted as compared with 375 in the previous year, whilst 526 estates were distributed, as compared with 498 in 1958. New trusts accepted and existing trusts discharged, however, were less than in the previous year.

27. Assets held by the Public Trustee (but excluding immovable property and personal effects) rose in value from £199,000 on 1st January, 1959, to £208,000 on 31st December, 1959.

#### **ENEMY PROPERTY**

28. Although the litigation which at the end of 1958 was pending in an interlocutory matter before the Court of Appeal for Eastern Africa in one matter was concluded during the year in favour of the Custodian of Enemy Property, the original suit was still pending before the Supreme Court at the end of the year. In its nature this litigation is likely to prove protracted, and as several claims also remain to be finalized the completion of this function is still likely to take some time.

### **The Bankruptcy and Companies Liquidation Section**

29. This section deals with bankruptcies, the compulsory winding-up of companies and the registration of Deeds of Arrangement.

#### **BANKRUPTCIES**

30. There was a slight, but nonetheless welcome, reduction in the number of fresh bankruptcies during the year from the record figure of 130 in 1958. In the event, 105 Receiving Orders were made during the year, of which 26 were made at Mombasa, 9 at Kisumu and 70 at Nairobi. Of the 115 debtors concerned, 84 were Asians, 29 were Europeans and 2 were Africans. Although fresh bankruptcy causes were less in number, the total amount of deficiencies as estimated by the debtors rose from £312,054 in 1958 to £332,842. The amount of assets realized during the year from debtors' estates and from debtors' contributions from after-acquired income was £96,997. This amount was considerably in excess of any previous year. From moneys realized a record sum of £54,414 was distributed in dividend to proved creditors. This figure was more than double the amount realized the previous year.

31. There were fewer prosecutions during the year than in 1958 owing to lack of professional staff. Eleven debtors were prosecuted for bankruptcy offences. Four cases were dismissed, but in the other seven cases convictions were secured. One debtor was fined, one was bound over, four were sentenced to imprisonment for periods of up to six months and one was sentenced to 12 months' imprisonment. A number of other cases were pending at the end of the year.

#### **COMPANY LIQUIDATIONS**

32. There was an increase in the number of cases in which the Official Receiver was called upon to liquidate companies in compulsory winding-up during



the year. Twenty Winding-up Orders in respect of such companies were made by the Court, of which three were made at Mombasa, one at Kisumu and 16 at Nairobi. The companies in liquidation comprised seven dealing in general merchandise, three in the building-contracting trade, two each in electrical contracting, farming and catering respectively, and one each in the timber, motor dealing, manufacturing and travel agency trades.

#### DEEDS OF ARRANGEMENT

33. Eight Deeds of Arrangement were registered. A number of Trustees had failed to submit their accounts in accordance with the Deeds of Arrangement Ordinance and at the end of the year it was found necessary to put in train the prosecution of certain Trustees.

#### GENERAL

34. An office was opened at Kisumu in April, 1959, to deal with insolvency work in that area. It is hoped that this action will speed up the administration of bankruptcy causes in Nyanza which has been the subject of several complaints from the public in the past.

35. The arrangement made in the latter part of 1958 whereby the bankruptcy jurisdiction of the Supreme Court was delegated to the Court of a Senior Resident Magistrate specially seconded for that purpose was, in the first half of the year, again proving beneficial in reducing the arrears of bankruptcy court work. During the absence of the magistrate concerned on vacation leave, during the latter half of the year, however, there was once again an accumulation of this work and at the end of the year there were 133 debtors awaiting the conclusion of their public examinations, a slight increase on the comparative figure at the end of 1958. 177 statutory meetings of creditors were held during the year.

#### BANKRUPTCY CONTINGENT FUND

36. The Income and Expenditure account for the year 1959 and a Balance Sheet as at 31st December, 1959, are set out as Appendix XX and Appendix XXI respectively.

#### **Estate Duty**

37. During the year Estate Duty was abolished with effect from 29th April, 1959, and as a consequence assessments ceased to be made in respect of estates of persons dying on or after that date. A detailed analysis of information relating to Estate Duty would relate only to a portion of the estates passing during the year and as such would not serve as a basis of comparison with the information given in the reports of the previous years. In the circumstances, therefore, the usual analysis has not been compiled. Appendix XXV, however, gives a summary of the duty assessed and collected during the year.

38. The number of estates passing and assessed during the year was 468. Of the total number of estates submitted for assessment 147 estates were dutiable; i.e. 31 per cent. The remaining estates were all under £5,000 in net value; such states have been exempt from duty since 1953. The percentage of dutiable estates was, in the event, higher than in 1958.

39. The number of estates reassessed was 213, the highest number of reassessments so far made. Out of this number 47 estates were in respect of refund of duty. Of the remaining 166, additional duty was collected in 131 estates and in the remaining 35 cases no duty was assessed. The amount of duty assessed during the year was £108,951, whilst the amount of duty reassessed was £36,483.



40. Estate Duty collected during the year was £159,035 which sum includes a sum of £1,386 received in advance and accounted as part of the revenue.

41. An amount of £31,500 was outstanding as uncollected at the end of the year. Most of this was either in respect of assessments made late in the year, the 30 days' grace which is allowed for payment not having elapsed, or was payable by instalments, with the approval of the Board of Estate Duty Commissioners, under section 14 or 23 respectively of the Estate Duty Ordinance.

### Trade Unions

42. At the end of the year there were 52 trade unions on the Register comprising 42 employees' and 10 employers' unions. The employees' trade unions consisted of 24 African, 7 Asian, 8 European and 3 unions with mixed membership whilst the employers' unions comprised eight with European and Asian members, one with European members and one with Asians respectively. During the course of the year one employers' union and ten employees' trade unions were registered. One African employees' union ceased to exist and its certificate of registration was cancelled. One trade union catering for African employees changed its name from the Tailors, Tents, Sailmaker and Garment Workers' Union to the Tailors and Textiles Workers' Union.

43. Details of the book and voting membership of the various trade unions on the Register, with particulars of their income and expenditure as shown by annual returns, are set out in Appendix XXVI hereto. The totals as shown by voting members of employees' trade unions were 58,906 and 45,929 respectively whilst employers' trade unions had a total of 314 book members and 314 voting members. The figures in respect of employees' trade unions were considerably in excess of the 1958 membership totals.

44. It is to be regretted that in spite of numerous warnings issued and prosecutions which have taken place in the past, unions still fail to submit their annual returns by the prescribed date. The chief offenders in this respect are again the African trade unions and in nearly every instance it appears that the reason for this is the lack of co-operations which exists between the head office and its branches. In an attempt to assist and guide the officers of trade unions in relation to their duties under the Trade Unions Ordinance, 1952, and the Regulations thereunder, notes were compiled for their guidance and during the month of December, 1959, sufficient copies of these notes were circulated to all trade unions to enable them to supply each of their branch offices with a copy.

45. Towards the latter part of the year the services of a further officer were obtained to assist in particular with the carrying out of inspections of trade unions' accounts. During the year a number of such inspections, both of the accounts of head offices and branches of trade unions were completed. As in previous years, these inspections revealed that many of the union officials, who were charged with the responsibility for keeping the books of accounts, had in fact very little knowledge as to how such accounts should be kept. In several instances, as a result of these inspections, trade union officers were prosecuted for peculation of union funds and were either placed on probation or sentenced to terms of imprisonment.

46. In spite of the agreement purported to have been reached during the year 1958, between the African trade unions affiliated to the Kenya Federation of Labour, on the field of recruitment and points of demarcation, numerous complaints were received that trade unions were poaching one another's members and that they were attempting, contrary to the provisions of their registered constitutions, to recruit and represent as members workers they were not entitled to recruit or represent.



47. During the month of November an application was submitted for the registration of a separate union to represent the workers employed in the quarry industry. Objections were raised to the application for registration of this union by the East African Federation of Building and Construction Workers' Union which claimed that it was sufficiently representative of the workers employed in this industry. Numerous meetings were held with both parties and suggestions made to them whereby their apparent differences might be resolved. It is to be regretted, however, that, up to the present time, the two parties have not been able to resolve their differences, which appear to be conditioned more by personal rivalries and political disputes than by a purely trade union disagreement.

### Societies

48. The number of applications for registration decreased over that of the preceding year; 231 new registrations being effected as against 338 in 1958. 73 societies were granted exemption from registration and 14 societies were refused registration. The racial breakdown of the 231 societies registered, by reference to the community of the office-bearers or actual membership was:—

African, 159; Asian, 27; European, 16; Arab and Sudanese, 15; multi-racial, 14.

Twenty-seven political associations were registered during the year; these societies comprised 11 Africans, 4 Asian, 6 European, 1 Somali and 5 multi-racial.

49. Officers of the Department carried out a number of inspections of records of societies some of which were found to be very well kept whilst others were found not to be so, in such cases the officials concerned were advised how to put the affairs of their societies in order. Much work was put into the investigation of complaints against the office-bearers of the Sikh Union, Nakuru, the final report on which was mainly responsible for an amicable settlement of the dispute between the office-bearers and the dissident members.

50. During the latter part of the year the staff of the section was increased by the secondment of an administrative officer to it who was appointed Assistant Registrar of Societies and by the appointment of an Assistant Societies Officer. This resulted in the work of the section being speeded up and enabled a more detailed scrutiny to be made of the constitution of societies to ensure that they started life with a sound and workable constitution. A more thorough check on breaches of the Societies Ordinance and Rules was also made possible; although no prosecutions were instituted, a number of warnings were given which had the desired effect.

### Banks and Building Societies

#### BANKS

51. Two new banking institutions were licensed during the year—the United Dominions Corporation (East Africa) Limited and the Ismailia Corporation Ltd. Lombard Banking Limited transferred its business in the Colony to its subsidiary Lombard Banking (East Africa) Limited, now called Lombard Banking Kenya Limited.

52. Statistics relating to banking institutions are published by the East African Statistical Department in the Quarterly Economic and Statistical Bulletin and are not therefore reproduced here.

#### BUILDING SOCIETIES

53. A new society, the Century Building Society, was registered during the year.



54. Statistics as to the business transacted by local and foreign building societies are set out in Appendix XXVII. Part I of this Appendix relates to the business transacted by local building societies. Part II of this Appendix relates to the local business transacted by foreign societies. Part III of this Appendix relates to the overall business transacted by foreign societies registered under the Ordinance. It should be noted that it is not possible to evaluate the financial status of a foreign building society by reference to its local transactions. In order to arrive at such evaluation the whole of the society's transactions must be considered in all the territories in which it is operating.

55. So far as the East African Building Society and Kentanda Mutual Building Society are concerned the statistics given are in respect of their first accounts which reflect only the comparatively small amount of initial business transacted.

### Accounts and Establishment Section

#### REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE

56. Fees collected by the Department in respect of its various services totalled £40,031, a further £142,515 was collected as estate duty and miscellaneous revenue was £2,577, thus giving a total departmental revenue of £185,123. The total expenditure of the Department on personal emoluments and other charges (exclusive of a sum of £1,228 paid from Emergency Funds) was £43,482.

57. A statement showing the various investments, deposits and cash balances held by the Registrar-General in his various capacities as at the beginning and end of the year will be found at Appendix XXX. Immovable property and personal effects of estates under administration in the Department are excluded from the statement. The latter shows that there was an overall increase in investments and cash balances of £44,708 at 31st December, 1959, when the value of assets held amounted to £473,535.

#### ESTABLISHMENT

58. To meet the very considerable increase in society and trade union work two additional posts in the professional and administrative grades and four posts in the executive and clerical grades were added to the establishment during the year. It had not proved possible, however, by the end of the year to recruit a professional officer with the necessary experience to the vacant post.

59. Shortly before the end of year Mr. R. H. Munro, L.I.B., the Deputy Registrar-General, was offered and accepted a transfer to the post of Deputy Registrar-General, Hong Kong. By his departure the Department will have lost an officer of exceptional ability who, during his four years in the Colony, has rendered services of an outstanding nature.
